Planters We are hoping to replace the existing planters around the Village next year and install some at Santon, Station Area and Clapp Gate. Still at the planning stage. The Winter Flowering Pansies have been set and we have volunteers to water six of the existing planters over winter, thank you for that. If anyone would like to offer to look after any of the remaining – Risby Road, Ermine Street South, Churchside and Paul Lane N/W end we'd be grateful. Hopefully that will continue into next summer's bedding plants too.

Maintenance Mark Thornborough our North Lincolnshire Council (NLC) Ward Officer has agreed to visit the Wednesday Pop In Café morning to fall in with Neighbourhood Watch and Community Police dates (see Dates for your diary page 6) - should you wish to bring anything to his attention. Mark has agreed to install more reflective signs opposite the Church and down Carr Lane to protect those verges and NLC will repair the pavement issues on the footpath near the Post Box on School Lane, so his recent visit has paid dividends already, plus we've been able to determine certain responsibilities. Similar concerns can be made directly to NLC via their website www.northlincs.gov.uk or by telephone 01724 297000. The Parish Council has also written to ONGO about the hedge on Beck Lane adjacent to the bungalows, hopefully that issue is now resolved. We're hoping to have the Village signs around the Parish replaced soon.

Risby Road The first stage of repairs have been completed. The second stage is due to start in the next financial year which, when the repairs and widening have been completed, include the resurfacing along its whole length.

War Memorial housekeeping. For many years Tess and Don Coote have maintained the planter and War Memorial area for the Village, but time is finally catching up and Tess and Don are ready for a well deserved rest. A very big thank you for all they've done. David Walker their neighbour has kindly volunteered to take over the duties.

Newsletter I'd like to say a big thank you to Andrew Fowler our Newsletter compiler for the terrific job he does on behalf of the Parish Council and has done so over the last few years, along with his wife Gill who helps with proofreading which takes time too. Neither Andrew nor Gill are Parish Councillors, and shows their dedication to our Parish. Your Community Newsletter is as well finished as any professional job, so all credit to Andrew. It takes time and patience to produce and is well liked and appreciated by our residents.

Finally, thank you to our Parish Councillors, Derek Hall, Terry Beisty, Paul Johnson, Alan Coulton, Lisa Wilson, Rick Wilson (Deputy Chair) and our latest recruit Ian Hook, for their time and effort. The Parish Councillors can boast a very good attendance record, credit to them, and not forgetting our dedicated Parish Clerk, Lynne Watson. Also I have to mention a thanks to our Ward Councillors Holly Mumby Croft and Ivan Glover who have a similar impressive attendance record at PC meetings as well as helping us in our dealings with North Lincolnshire Council.



Latest News From Andrew's Hedgehog Hospital

What a manic autumn we have had. Lots and lots of babies under 200 gms followed by teenagers 200-300gms. Most of them carrying two or three parasites which needed urgent treatment so our volunteers have been really busy.

To make room for these new patients it has been necessary to appeal for fosterers to take the bigger ones for the winter which we have successfully achieved.

As you may have heard in September we lost Andrew (he was the first hedgehog taken into the hospital which we named after him)...



Unfortunately old age caught up with him and he died in his sleep. All our volunteers went into mourning as he was such a

special hedgehog and tributes came into our facebook page in their dozens from all around the country from the people who had met him.

Meanwhile after five years running the hospital from our home plans are going ahead for our new hospital which will, of course, be named after Andrew. It will be built at Elsham Hall and ground breaking day is 30th November 2017. (St Andrews Day). The event will be getting coverage from the press and TV and will be attended by invitation only guests. Unfortunately our Patron, The Duke of Marlborough cannot attend due to a prior engagement but has assured us he will be coming up to open the hospital in about eighteen months time. In due course this hedgehog hospital will become a wildlife hospital covering this part of the UK.

REMEMBER

If you see a hedgehog out and about during the day please pick it up, place in a box with a heat pad or hot water bottle, cover with fluffy blanket, offer a drink of water but no food and ring us for advice.

If a hedgehog weighs under 700 gms it needs to be taken in and overwintered as it may not survive hibernation.

Neighbourhood Watch

Overall crime figures for Broughton and Appleby Ward remain low and at the last Neighbourhood Action Team meeting the priority concern was for hare coursing. Our Community Police have put in extra hours to monitor this situation, this on top of their routine patrols. To date this autumn/winter the number of hare coursing activities in our Parish are lower than last year. (I hope that isn't tempting fate)

In the last Newsletter I included a report from the Hessle call centre regarding their process and procedures. I've received a further update to say that an automatic ring back facility has been put in place to help cope with the busiest times. This is for 101 calls only, 999 calls will continue with the highest priority. Although it may seem odd to have a call back system it does mean that people making a 101 call will be able to pass that information to the Police one way or another even during the busiest periods. The 101 number is for non emergency calls, and while it is still important to be able to give this information to the Police the priority must always be for 999 emergency and crimes in progress. Staffing at the hub works to an algorithm that under normal circumstance works to an accuracy of 1%, however there can still be occasions when excessive calls mean that there will be a wait, hence the call back system being put in place which will mean that more reports can be taken and logged. There was one such situation recently when a resident had to wait for 40 minutes to get an answer to a call. When checking the reason for this the call centre had 174 calls of which 90 were 999 calls in a period that would normally take an average of just 22 calls and of course the 999 calls took priority.

There is a perception that most crimes are committed in the dead of night, but in fact crime figures show that most crimes are committed during the day and most incidents are reported in the evening. Which on reflection would seem quite logical as most people these days are out at work and homes, including those of neighbours, are empty.

The Village Hall café continues to host Neighbourhood Watch visits on a regular basis with Sandra Joyce our lead Neighbourhood Watch contact from Safer Neighbourhoods visiting every 5 weeks with PCSO Katy McNally fitting in with the same period to visit the Pop In café (see Dates for your Diary page6) and carrying out an extra walk around the village. This on top of routine daily visits by our Community Police. Katy's visits were put in place to ensure that there would always be an opportunity for resident to speak to our local Police Officers. The café is also accommodating Mark Thornborough the North Lincs Council Ward Officer for our area at the same frequency, and an ONGO representative doing similar.



St Bartholomew's News from the Pews

Firstly, a huge thank you to all the helpers who willingly give their time and energy to help keep the churchyard grass in order and

the interior of the church clean. Your efforts are much appreciated.

The church lights have been sponsored every week this year and at present we are already booked into mid-January 2018. Over £600 has been raised so far. We are extremely grateful for this as all donations go towards the upkeep and repair of our church. If you wish to sponsor the lights for a celebration, memory or just wish to see them illuminated, then please get in touch by the Appleby Residents facebook page or ring 733484. (John or Rosemary).

The vestry floor has rotted and needs replacement due to poor ventilation and damp is a problem. Currently we are investigating the issue with a local builder. Stonework on the tower needs repair, a conservation stonemason has visited the site and we are awaiting a quote for this. Some of the beautiful stained-glass windows need repair, also the stonework around them. This work is being researched at present with the Head of Glazing at Lincoln Cathedral.

Appleby Church dates from the early 13th century, but had fallen into disrepair between 1775 and 1820. Between 1820 and 1823 William Fowler rebuilt the Nave, Chancel and the Tower.

Much of the 19th century restoration was carried out by the Winn family, owners of the Appleby (and Frodingham) Estate.

If you come to any of the events in the Church this Christmas you will be able to look at the magnificent interior of our church.

The nave roof carvings in stone and wood depict Angels playing a variety of musical instruments. The crowning glories of the church are the stained glass windows. There are examples of 16th Flemish carving on the pulpit and altar rails.

Because of the generosity of many villagers the beautifully carved Gargoyles and Grotesques adorning the walls are floodlit every evening during the year. The bell tower has an hourly striking clock which does not have an exterior face. The clock is being restored.

Several parts of the church are in need of maintenance, restoration or repair if the building is to be enjoyed by future generations

Your support is essential for keeping the building in good condition. Grants will need to be applied for and fund raising is also essential to go alongside grant application.



Village Hall News

As most of you will know the honorary secretary, Natalie Hogg, left the village in the summer of this year. As a mainstay of the committee her organisational skills and historical knowledge of village affairs

meant her contribution to the village hall was truly incredible and her shoes have been difficult to fill. Natalie's absence has made those of us remaining increasingly aware of the commitment she made in both time and expertise. Indeed finding her replacement has led the committee to dividing the tasks she undertook to make them less daunting and to this end I am grateful to Robin Richbell who agreed to take on the role of Fayre day secretary and to Clive Prior for organising bookings for event entertainments.

In November of last year we became aware of damp issues in the café area. A programme of work was established Preparation work for this was carried out by volunteers and included the removal of cupboards and units from the kitchen and café, the removal of floor coverings and radiators, and, the relocating of all equipment from each area into the hall for storage whilst work was done. On completion of the repairs a reverse operation was carried out by the same team and without their willingness to assist it would have led to a longer period of hall closure and a higher financial cost. The use of the meeting room was made available during this period. Initial estimates of all this work was around £3000 but due to the more extensive work needing to be carried out the final costs, including new floor coverings and equipment came to £6300.

All areas were back in use by the end of January and have maintained a steady use since then. As part of our ongoing updating of hall facilities a baby changing unit has been installed in the disabled toilet.

Of particular credit to the hall this year has been the development of the community cafe into a wider community hub. In addition to it's providing a social meeting place over tea and biscuits for residents an invitation has been extended to representatives of organisations directly providing services to the village. Parish council, Safer neighbourhoods / neighbourhood watch, Community police / PCSO's, ONGO and North Lincolnshire Council (NLC) rural officers have all attended to discuss issues of local concern and continue to attend on a regular basis to make themselves available to the public and keep in touch with current issues.

Despite further disruption to the hall this year the committee has continued to organise fund raising events to promote the use of the building by all residents of the parish. Pub and quiz evenings continue to be popular and the addition of folk nights has been particularly successful. Future evenings will see a return for Rural Touring theatre and musical groups. The next of these will be 'jango Starr' 'one man shoe'. A unique style of silent physical comedy theatre for children and adults. Booked for 16th March 2018.

In August of this year our kitchen was inspected and achieved a 4 star rating. The 5th star was not awarded due to our not keeping a food storage record book. This has now been rectified

Following an inquiry by village members and the WI we have agreed that a Christmas tree will be erected at the front of the hall during the festive period and this will be lit with LED lights.

This year's Fayre day benefitted from the committees continuing search for new ideas to be incorporated into a trusted format. Under the investigative stewardship of Bex Quainton and Clive Prior performing pooches were changed for ducks, baton twirlers replaced by morris dancers and dog showing was beaten into submission by Tai Ko drummers. Our grateful thanks also to Bex who in addition to securing many prizes for the raffle persuaded her sister, Jen Pringle , a children's presenter on channel 5's show 'Milkshake', to supervise a children's drawing competition and awarded prizes at the end of the day.

Sustaining the Fayre is integral to the future of the hall . For the Fayre to evolve and build on its success new enthusiasm and ideas need to be captured for 2018. If anyone feels that they could help with a particular area or has ideas about its organisation I would urge them to contact the fayre day secretary. You don't need to belong to the village hall management committee to help in the fayre organisation and fresh faces and ideas are always welcome.



October meeting: the speaker for the evening was Mr Kevin Webster who gave an informative talk on cheese making. His interest developed from reading a book and having been given a cheese making machine.

To date Kevin has successfully made many continental and British style cheeses. His favourite is Roquefort, a blue sharp french cheese. The WI ladies tested some creamy ricotta which had an excellent taste and texture. The books which sparked Kevin's interest is called The Art of cheese making and Cheese making for beginners by Paul Peacock

Refreshments were served and a raffle held at the end of the evening.

November meeting: this evening was a craft demonstration and making session by Pam Palmer. Pam is a skilled craftsperson and encouraged the WI to decorate Christmas gift bags, glass opts with LED lights, small garlands and metal pots which were ideal as Christmas gift holders or plant pots.

Pam also gave a brief talk on the technique of Decoupage

This activity was thoroughly enjoyed by all especially those like myself who feel they are not skilled enough to decorate craft items. There were some really good end results.

The WI clearly has some talent. Thank you Pam Palmer for sharing your skills

The evening ended with refreshments and a raffle

Dec 6th: Christmas is here again and so we celebrate with a party serving lots of tasty seasonal food made by the members. We also have an exchange of gifts. Tess Coote makes a delicious mulled wine, as always, Thank you Tess. This makes for a festive evening and puts everyone in a Christmas mood.
