The situation is serious as I do not think the Diocese will be happy for this to continue indefinitely.

Please understand that it is not realistic or possible to expect the vicar and the Ministry team to take on these responsibilities. If you wish a Christian presence to continue in Appleby parish we DO need your help urgently. Please consider helping us by putting yourself forward to join the Appleby parish PCC. A PCC (not to be confused with the Parish Council) is the executive committee of a Church of England church. The PCC consists of clergy a churchwardens of the parish, together with representatives of the laity (the people of the parish). Legally the PCC is responsible for the financial affairs of the church and the maintenance of its assets, the biggest of which is the church itself, and for promoting the mission of the church.

At the moment we are managing to hold fortnightly services at St Bartholomew's on the first & 3rd Sunday of each month at 9.15

Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan The result of the Referendum for our Neighbourhood Plan is covered at page 3 of the Newsletter, but it can't go without a mention here and a big thank you to the Group that put so much into it and to all residents for their participation. The end of that process is now just the start of the next step in the process which is that of our Councillors to make use of the Plan from now until 2030 when responding to Planning Applications.

Planning Applications relating to our Parish can now be seen on the PC website www.applebypc.org.uk/Planning 25382.aspx

A further move towards more transparency of Parish Council business. Agendas, minutes and accounts are just some of the things available to be seen.

I've mentioned the input of our residents to different groups within the Parish in the last few issues and to follow on from this I need to mention the work done by **WI** for our Community. They have supported other groups for so long, particularly the Church and Fayre Day. Many members have been active for a number of years, Wendy Marshall is the current President, Ann Drury is Secretary and has been for some 10 years along with other initiatives in the Village, Jackie Johnson is a Trustee Representative for WI Federation, which takes her beyond this area. Gladys Siddal is the current Treasurer and Sheila Rhodes has been a previous President. The reason I want make an extra mention of Gladys and Sheila is the fact that neither live in Appleby but contribute so much to our Community. Sheila works tirelessly for the Village Hall and Fayre Day and elsewhere in the area. Gladys has not only been Treasurer for WI but has also acted as Clerk for Parish Council in the past.

The Bingo Group hold regular sessions at the Village Hall which are always well attended. The evenings are organised by Elizabeth Hebblewhite and Anne Harrison with the great help of a host of people quietly getting on with the job and providing an evening out for residents. Newcomers may not be aware that Elizabeth is our Parish "paper girl" and has been for many years, her round lasting beyond normal retirement age. Elizabeth's mum Elsie Blanchard carried out that job before her. There is always something special to say about Appleby! Bingo dates are in the *Dates for your diary* section (page 6).

A number of issues have been brought to the parish councils attention as follow:

Dog fouling is still a concern. The vast majority of people pick up after their dogs. Did you know that you can report dog fouling directly to North Lincs Council on their website https://www.northlincs.gov.uk/planning-and-environment/environmental-crime/dog-control/dog-fouling/, or by calling 01724 297000. This reporting can lead to Wardens carrying out checks in the area, hopefully with an outcome of fewer dog fouling incidents. NLC staff can clean up fouling from hard surfaces, but not the grass surfaces of the playing field.

Please keep you eye on your dogs wherever you are . This last mention relates to the whole parish. Dogs running loose can frighten residents, wildlife and also the birds from the shoots which play a big part in the economy of our Rural Community.

On road parking. Appleby is a wonderful place to walk around and has charming but narrow roads, which can present a problem. Cars shouldn't park on footpaths, causing pedestrians to walk on the road, which can be a real hazard for those with young children. Parking on the road itself can create issues in some locations as other vehicles cannot pass without mounting the soft verges causing damage. The best solution is for vehicles whether owned or visiting, to park on owners drives.

Hedges. Virtually all the hedges around Appleby Village are kept neat and tidy and look great as they always do. Please try to make sure that the clearance on the footpaths is adequate for pedestrians, especially for those with young children.

Planters 2019

I'm sure that you'll all agree that the Planters throughout the Parish have looked really good throughout the winter. As we move into the warmer weather it would be great if watering by residents was continued this year. That worked really well last year with only the occasional top up required by Cutting Edge who will carry out all other maintenance and who made a splendid job of that. We'll be sourcing our bedding plants from Linden Nurseries at the Station area again and many thanks for their help.

We've entered the Best Kept Village competition again where we came third out of 16 entries in 2018. Residents gardens always look good in general, especially around hedges and frontages. The competition is normally judged mid to late July if that helps. But once again, thank you for all your efforts last year.

Air Quality Report Santon

Concerns were highlighted during consultation for the Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan about the air quality around Santon. It was accepted that via this newsletter we would issue occasional reports on the subject. In this regard the following information has been compiled with the help and assistance of NLC Environmental Protection Team who are charged with the responsibility of monitoring air quality in the county.

Air Quality and how it measured is a very technical subject which can be perplexing to understand as the details are often explained in scientific language and abbreviations which to a lay person can be confusing. In the following we have tried to explain the some of abbreviations used and there source.

Air quality standards and guidelines are laid down by the Department for Environment Food & Rural Affairs (Defra) for more information on this subject please follow the link: https://uk-air.defra.gov.uk

The Air Quality Monitoring Station at Santon records a variety of pollutants including

- 1. Nitrogen Dioxide (NO2) are mainly associated vehicles emissions,
- 2. Sulphur Dioxide (S02) a corrosive, acidic gas which combines with water vapour in the atmosphere to produce acid rain.
- 3. PM10 (particulate matter with an aerodynamic of less than 10 microns) mainly associated with emissions from stockpiles, roadways, construction sites, fields, fires.etc and consists of dust, pollen, soot, smoke, and liquid droplets
- 4. Pollutants for national transport networks PAH [Polycyclic Aromatic Hydrocarbons] and HM [Hydrocarbons])

The Air Quality Objectives for SO2 and NO2 at the Santon were complied with for 2018 achieving the 85% data capture target.

There are two instruments at the Santon site measuring PM10, known as a TEOM (Tapered Element Oscillating Microbalance) which is used to continuously measure particulate concentration and FDMS (Filter Dynamics Measurement System) which monitors the core and volatile fractions of airborne particulates matter

- Both instruments showed compliance with the annual (yearly) mean Air Quality Objective for 2018.
- However, the TEOM at this site shows an exceedance of the (daily) 24 hour mean Air Quality Objective for 2018.

North Lincolnshire Council are currently in the process of reviewing the Air Quality Action Plan for the Scunthorpe Town Air Quality Management Area (AQMA), this is put in place to bring about improvements in local air quality.

Now it is approved by the result of the referendum our neighbourhood plan attains the same legal status as the NLC Local Plan

The objective of the plan is to protect the character of the parish, ensuring any future development is appropriate in design and materials to any part of the parish whether be the Station Area, Santon, Clapp Gate, Appleby conservation area or Vicarage Park,.

Neighbourhood planning provides a powerful set of tools for local people to ensure that they get the right types of development for their community where the ambition of the neighbourhood is aligned with the strategic needs and priorities of the wider local area.

Details of the Conservation Area Design Statement and the Parish Design Statement can be found in the Appendices to the Plan. It will assist individuals and architects planning projects and help the Parish Council to determined if the project is in keeping with its surroundings.

The plan also covers community aspirations and wishes for more footpaths and walking routes around the parish including work on developing a heritage trail and playground for children at Santon.

There is plenty for everybody to get involved with and it is exciting that we have a framework to guide us for the next 15 years.

Thank you to everybody who has been involved in the development process giving views attending meetings and consultations, completing surveys, it was all worth it.

There are some basic requirements

A person is qualified to be elected and to be a councillor if they are a British, Commonwealth, Irish or European Union citizen and on the relevant day (that is, the day of nomination or election) they are 18 or over. In addition, the person must meet at **least one of the following criteria:-**

- Be registered as a Local Government Elector for the Parish on the current Electoral Register.
- 2. Has during the whole of the previous 12 months occupied as tenant or owner any land or other premises in the Parish.
- Has had his/her principal or only place of work in the previous 12 months in the Parish of Appleby.
- 4. Has resided either in the Parish or within 3 miles thereof during the previous 12 months.

Certain people are disqualified from standing, these include:

- a. Paid officers (including the Clerks) of the council,
- b. Bankrupts
- c. Those subject to recent sentences of imprisonment
- d. Being found guilty of corruption

Report Humberside Rural Policing Advisory Panel

Meeting held on 21 March

Operation Galileo which is aimed at hare coursing throughout Humberside reported a reduction of some 35% this season compared to last and the numbers for North Lincolnshire were down to 71 daytime incidents.

Appleby itself was also dramatically improved again and is not considered a Hot Spot for the second season running. Our Gamekeeper Glyn has been at the head of that reduction in Appleby and puts much of that down to the reporting of incidents and suspicious vehicles by you the residents. The 101 number is still the way to report suspicious activities but 999 should be used for Crimes in Progress.

A number of other rural issues were discussed, one being road safety. At our last PC meeting a resident asked if speed monitoring could be carried out at non regular times. The Safer Roads Humber representative has agreed to take that issue forward.
