**Conservation Area** We asked NLC Conservation Officer Eddie Rychlak, and NLC Planner Andrew Law to give a presentation to Parish Council at our June meeting as we are sometimes asked questions regarding development and are required to make comments on Planning Applications. The notes from the meeting are contained in a pullout section (pages 3 to 6) of this newsletter. Councillors are not trained Planners and we hope the article is also of use to residents.

**HGVs** Due to the situation at British Steel their representatives for, the traffic meetings relating to Santon and Appleby have been cancelled until a later date. However we have had further recent incidents on Ermine Street which the Parish council needs to discuss

**Our Neighbourhood** Plan was approved by North Lincs Council Planning Committee on 5th June and now any decisions by North Lincs Council Planners and the Planning

Committee on Planning Applications for our Parish must take the Plan into account. Our Parish Council will, and has used, the Plan, as our guide when determining our responses to Planning Applications. As previously mentioned, Appleby is the first Council in North Lincolnshire to have a Neighbourhood Plan.



**Fayre Day** had the weather to contend with this year and in the circumstances was still well attended, many of our residents made a great effort to help with the setting up, running and clearing of the Fayre which provides much needed financial help towards the maintenance and running of Village Hall, which is the hub of the Community.

What may not be known is that local farmers cut the grass in the paddock that is used for parking. Tom Ogg of Winteringham took care of that this year, despite the atrocious weather running up to the day, which prevented the clearing of the hay, which was also lost as feed stock.

Best Kept Village judging will be carried out towards the middle/end of July. As usual we have stocked up the planters around Appleby Village as well as the rest of the Parish, which includes the replacement of the last two older ones, and we'd be grateful if the same people that did such a great job of watering the planters throughout last year can do the same again this year. The Village always looks good and residents are justifiably proud of how their gardens and hedges look. The verges around the village are largely the responsibility of North Lincs Council, which is restricted regarding what can be done by funding, and so any help on frontages will only improve the appearance too.

**The Village Hall café morning** continues to thrive and is also used by ONGO and our Community Police to meet with residents. Any help in setting up and making teas and coffees each Wednesday morning between 10:30 and 12 noon would be appreciated.

# Appleby Parish Council Conservation Update 10 June 2019

# The following was presented to Appleby Parish Council by Eddie Rychlak NLC Conservation Officer Andrew Law NLC Planner

The Appleby conservation area was designated in 1972 and at the same time an Article 4 Direction was placed on the area which removes certain permitted development rights (rights to carry out works without the need for planning permission). This Article 4 Direction relates to residential properties only.

In 2005, after the Conservation areas was appraised and re-assessed, the Appleby Conservation Area was extended to encompass most of the whole of the historical village envelope. The new extension included the early street pattern with many historical properties as well as some sympathetically designed new build properties. This area is NOT covered by an Article 4 Direction.

In the original conservation area (covered by the Article 4 Direction) planning permission is required for the following works that would not normally require consent:

- Extensions to residential properties
- · Changing windows and doors
- · New external facing materials
- · Changing roofing materials
- · The erection of a porch outside any external door

The construction of a hard standing within the curtilage of a dwelling house.

Information regarding the need for planning permission is also available via the interactive house on the planning portal website via the following link: https://interactive.planningportal.co.uk/.

#### Assessment

The planning system is a plan led system and all applications must be determined in accordance with the adopted local development plan for the area unless other material considerations indicate otherwise. Therefore, all planning applications are reviewed against the relevant development plan policies and, in respect of development proposals within conservation areas, this will include the policies identified below.

The Development Plan for North Lincolnshire currently comprises the North Lincolnshire Local Plan 2003, the North Lincolnshire Core Strategy 2011, the Housing and Employment Land Allocations Development Plan Document 2016 and Neighbourhood Plans produced for specific settlements and Parishes.

Further to the above, it is important to note that all planning applications must be determined on their own individual merits and that development may be considered acceptable on one site, whilst the same (or similar) development is deemed unacceptable on other sites.

Town and Parish Council's play an important role in the determination of planning applications by representing the local community and providing a source of local knowledge that may not otherwise be available to the local planning authority. It is important that if the Town/Parish council either

Support or object to a planning application that clear reasons for doing so are provided. These reasons should be based on the relevant policies of the development plan and other material planning considerations.

A case officer will be appointed to process each planning application and this officer will be able to provide further advice about specific cases should this be required.

## Do I need planning permission?

#### Some guide lines that may help

Are you planning to extend or carry out work to your home? Before you start with your proposed works you should check and satisfy yourself as to whether or not planning permission is required.

What is permitted development?

Some minor alterations and extensions, particularly to houses, can often be carried out without the need for planning permission. This is known as permitted development.

The Planning Portal is a national initiative to give advice on planning matters, including permitted development. You can use the Planning Portal to get advice, complete forms, upload plans and other supporting information and pay any required fee. You can also use their Interactive House tool to find out if you need planning permission for the works you want to carry out.

The site has further link to an interactive planning portal *The Planning Interactive House* www.interactive.planningportal.co.uk

Alternatively, you can complete a **Permitted Development Enquiry form** which can be down loaded in a PDF format [1Mb] and return to the NLC Planning Department with the appropriates fee.

A Schedule of fees for pre-application enquiries can be downloaded in a PDF formate from the same site mentioned above.

The fees are in line with the Governments' regulations which came into place in January 2018.

If you submit a Permitted Development Enquiry form NLC will asses and let you know in writing whether or not you need planning permission.

Where planning permission is required, NLC recommend that you obtain advice from them before submitting your application. This enables you find out whether the council is likely to support your proposal, before you commit to any further expense.

By seeking advice it facilitates the opportunity to work with them to reduce any likelihood for the need to change your proposal once a formal application has been submitted and avoid a delay in receiving a decision.

It is your responsibility to seek planning permission. If required, planning permission and building regulation approval should be granted before work begins

#### **Relevant Policy**

The key overarching duty imposed by national legislation is that development in conservation areas should 'preserve and enhance the character of the conservation area'. This is set out in Section 72 of the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990 and is reinforced through local planning policies and guidance documents.

The key local Development Plan Policy in this regard is currently policy HE2 (Development in Conservation Areas) of the North Lincolnshire Local Plan 2003, which sets out requirements for all development proposals in conservation areas; and policy AP13 of the Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan, which sets out requirements specific to the Appleby Conservation Area.

Further guidance regarding the Appleby conservation area is set out in the "Appleby Conservation Area Appraisal" and the "Appleby Village Design Statement" documents.

These local policies and guidance documents can be accessed via the council's website at the following web address: https://www.northlincs.gov.uk/planning-and-environment/ planning-policy/.

National planning policy is also a material consideration in the determination of planning applications and the relevant requirements in respect of development in conservation areas can be found in Chapter 16 (Conserving and enhancing the historic environment) of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) 2019. This document can be accessed at: https://assets.publishing.service.gov.uk/government/uploads/system/ uploads/attachment\_data/file/807247/NPPF\_Feb\_2019\_revised.pdf.

It is therefor advisable for all Appleby Parish and specifically Appleby village residents to seek initial planning advice prior to submission of a Planning Application to avoid possible disappointment and expense.




