## Councillor Hall Steps down as Chairman



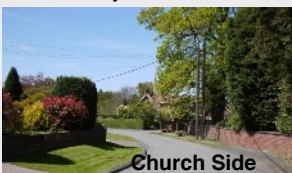
I have now stood aside as Chairman, Councillor Ivor Keyes was proposed and voted to take up the mantle to lead the Council, which he has accepted. Councillor

It's a stable ship, and there are 'rocks' ahead, but I'm convinced that Appleby Parish Council will continue to weather any storm that comes along after all it has been going a long time and has experienced 'hands' on the tiller.

Keeping the planters watered is difficult. We have a contract with Garden Angels for specific watering, but in very dry hot weather the frequency may fall short and it would be a great help if you could check the planters near you when passing and water if required. We wouldn't want this to be felt as an obligation, but everyone can help in this respect.

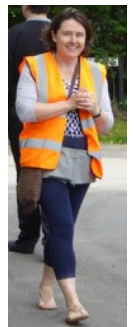

## Appleby Parish Emergency Plan

Over the years the process of emergency planning has been utilised by large councils to ensure they know how to react if a situation arises which is unusual, catastrophic, or has large scale impacts within communities.

Situations such as these can be caused by major accidents, acts of terrorism, or something as simple as weather situations, water leaks, power cuts, which in turn may require a response from councils in order to assist with the emergency services or CNI sectors (CRITICAL NATIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE), it all sounds very dramatic, and in situations such as Manchester and London it defiantly was not only dramatic but also very necessary. **Cont on Page 2**



## Risby Road Improvements



Appleby Parish Council has received the following information:

North Lincolnshire Council plan to carry out work to improve the road from Winterton Road to Appleby (Risby Road). The first phase is due to start on the 7th August 2017 with a completion date of 3rd November 2017

This first phase will include work to move electric and BT cables as well as widening of the existing road. The exact location of the 1st phase works is yet to be finalised but is likely to be in two sections. Section 1 from Brackenholmes Road through Low Risby towards Appleby, section 2 from Winterton Road towards and including the bends at Sawcliffe Farm.

The remaining widening and resurfacing is currently programmed for the following financial year.

For the safety of the workforce and public the work will be carried out during a Road Closure order. Access will be maintained to properties except when work is carried out adjacent to the property. Of course when no work is taking place overnight and at the weekend vehicles will be able to pass through the works with due care.

Normal working hours will be 07.30 to 17.00 Monday to Friday

Emergency access will be maintained at all times.

Our parish is unlikely to ever have to rely upon one of the emergency response plans due to our proximity to major populated areas such as Scunthorpe, Brigg, and Winterton and Hull in the other direction. This does not however negate the requirement to complete one.

The parish has for the last few years had a plan in place, which has been metaphorically stored on the shelf and never required, but due to the many changes within the population of our parish, expansion and the changing requirements, we as a council believe the plan requires a review to bring it up to date.

We need your help please, in order to complete this by updating the information you supplied a few years back.

All information we collect will be treated as strictly confidential and will not be made public in any documentation whatsoever, but will be used as reference upon how to form the requirements for our new plan.

How can you help?

Would you be willing to help out during an emergency?

Do you have any particular skills or equipment that you believe may be of use?

There is no obligation on anyone who volunteers, it will just mean that we may call you in an emergency to ask if you are free to help.

If you think you might need support during an emergency we would also like to hear from you.

Support might be something as simple as checking to see if you're ok, to ensure we keep a look out for our elderly or disabled residents.

If you have any particular essential requirements for example a medical requirement, then we can incorporate those elements into our response, but we do need to know who and where you are.

## Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan

### Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan Group

The Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Planning Group has been informed by local landowners that during North Lincolnshire Council's recent consultation on their new Local Plan they have proposed sites for future development. The new NLC Local Plan is looking at development for the whole of North Lincolnshire in the next 15-20 years.

It is important at this stage we assess residents views on the proposed sites within our parish hence the affect it would have on our neighbourhood plan.

Please complete the flier giving your views and return it to the Village Hall or complete the on line consultation [www.applebypc.org.uk](http://www.applebypc.org.uk) (details of which are on the flier). Only one response can be submitted per devise. Please see the flier for more details and a map of the sites.

All the proposed sites are within Appleby Village there are no proposals for Santon or Clapp Gate

The sites which have been suggested for inclusion in the development boundary for Appleby are.

- Site 1 Grounds of Old Appleby Hall;
- Site 2 Land next to church ('Hector's Field', the old plant nursery area);
- Site 3 Paddock opposite church;
- Site 4 Fields at the end of School Lane.
- Site 5 is Jackson's Farm Barn Area and the site opposite on Risby Road.

As things stand all these sites except the Paddock Area are outside the Development Boundary for Appleby Village where development is strictly controlled and normally limited to uses which are suitable for a location in the countryside.

The Paddock Area (site 3) is protected from development by a North Lincolnshire Council Policy LC11 designation. Following the views given during the Residents 'Drop in' day Appleby Parish Council is applying for Local Green Space designation for the Paddock.

There is also existing LC11 protection for Site 2 the area next to and including St Bartholomew's Church. The Parish Council is also applying for Local Green Space designation for the Playing Field again in line with the views given during the 'drop in' day.

We do not know if North Lincolnshire Council will alter the Development Boundary for the parish following the completion of their Local Plan consultation. However, we thought it right to ask residents for your views on the potential development of these sites. Please make every effort to respond.

The full plan is progressing well with the near completion of the report, a summary of the proposed policies will be circulated to every household shortly. The full report will be on line and a paper version available at the Village Hall.

Appleby has done very well in previous years including winning Best Kept Village in 2013.

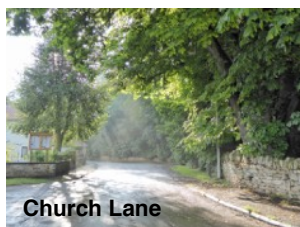
Everyone can assist in achieving this accolade by keeping their hedges and adjacent verges trim as well maintaining their gardens in good order.

Unless an election is requested this position will be filled by co-option at the meeting of the Council to be held on Tuesday 25 July 2017 at 7.00pm in Appleby Village Hall.

Councillors are elected but are unpaid for their time. Becoming a parish councillor is a rewarding experience and often described by those that get involved as a way of giving something back to their community. As a Councillor, your time will be well spent and will provide a sense of satisfaction. The council meet for approximately two hours once a month depending on what needs to be discussed. Council meetings are open to the public.

There are some basic requirements as below.

Qualifications to be a Councillor

A person is qualified to be elected and to be a councillor if they are a British, Commonwealth, Irish or European Union citizen and on the relevant day (that is, the day of nomination or election) they are 18 or over. In addition, the person must meet at least one of the following criteria:-

1. Be registered as a Local Government Elector for the Parish on the current Electoral Register.
2. Has during the whole of the previous 12 months occupied as tenant or owner any land or other premises in the Parish.
3. Has had his/her principal or only place of work in the previous 12 months in the Parish of Appleby.
4. Has resided either in the Parish or within 3 miles thereof during the previous 12 months.

Certain people are disqualified from standing, these include:

- a. Paid officers (including the Clerks) of the council,
- b. Bankrupts
- c. Those subject to recent sentences of imprisonment
- d. Being found guilty of corruption

## Extract of minutes from PC meeting 23 May 2016

Progressing from council minutes into real short and long action within our community is reported on this our quarterley Your Community Newsletter.

### Minute 17/66 To receive and consider any updates regarding establishing Allotments in Appleby.

It was not possible to provide allotments in Appleby village, therefore, arrangements had been made with Winterton Town Council and residents were able to apply for allotments on Holme Lane, Winterton. An article was to go in the next edition of the Newsletter advising residents to contact Lisa at Winterton Town Council to express an interest. **Action:** Councillor Hall to provide article.

### Minute 17/67 Emergency Plan.

The plan had been reviewed and the only issues were personnel issues. Confirmation that those named were still happy to continue in their specified role was required. The suggestion of a table top exercise was agreed as a good idea. This would help to ensure that the Parish Council can meet the requirements. It was agreed to invite representatives from both nursing homes. A date to be proposed for mid-summer. **Resolved:** Councillors Keyes and R Wilson to follow up on personnel, arrange exercise and invite relevant representatives. **Cont on Page 6**

## Frodingham Iron and Steel Works Timeline

Another in a series of looking at the Iron and Steel heritage of Appleby Parish, this time detailing the timeline development of the Frodingham Iron Co. from 1864 to 1934

1864 Rowland Winn [of Appleby Hall ] agreed with a Leeds brick maker, Joseph Cliff, to take a lease on parts of Winn's land at Appleby and Frodingham to mine ironstone. Joseph Cliff and his brother-in-law, William Edward Hirst, were to have 93 acres in Scunthorpe and Frodingham, and 300 acres at Appleby. Before signing Cliff had begun to lay out his works in the village of Frodingham with technical advice on furnace construction from Stockton-on-Tees. The new firm took the name the Frodingham Iron Co.

1865 May, the first furnace was blown-in. The initial casts gave a daily make of five tons; later this was increased to twelve tons.

1871 Cliff built two more furnaces at Frodingham and replaced his earlier ones with two larger furnaces. John Gjers from Teeside advised on the new plant. The new stacks, sixty-three feet high and eighteen feet in the bosh, were put to work at the end of March 1871.

1876 Appleby Ironworks' first furnaces were ready for blowing.

The output of the early producers in the Scunthorpe was basic pig iron which was suitable for forging but less useful for foundry work because of its relatively high manganese content. Much of the pig iron was therefore sent to the bar, sheet and wire trade of Staffordshire.

1887 Crude steel was first made at Frodingham, but this was considered not to be viable.

1890 Frodingham Iron Co made the first steel in the area by the basic process method invented by Sidney Gilchrist Thomas though they had to seek outside help to refine the method.

1904 Incorporated as a limited liability company with the trading name of Frodingham Iron and Steel Co (FISCL)

1912 the Frodingham company absorbed the Appleby company each continued to trade under their own names.

1917 both Frodingham Iron Co and Appleby Ironworks became part of the United Steel Companies.

1918 By the end of the First World War total crude steel production was approaching 300,000 tons, with pig production almost double that.

1931/2 The Frodingham Iron and Steel Co. absorbed the North Lincolnshire Ironworks bring it within the United Steel Company.

1934 Frodingham and Appleby firms were formally amalgamated into the Appleby-Frodingham Steel Company (App-Frod).

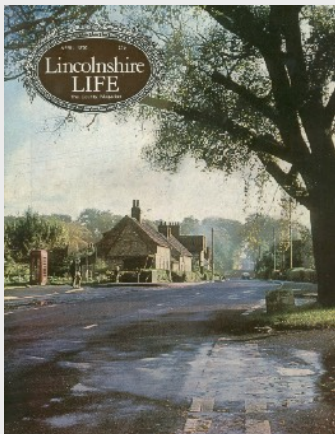
## Did you know?

\* In the Middle Ages principal crops of this "Claylands" area were wheat, barley and peas. Hemp was an occasional crop for example Thomas Luddington of Appleby had a hemp garth in 1591.

\* At the junction of Ermine Street with Risby Road on the traffic island, edged with a blue brick kerb, are two medieval cross bases. These are important relics which appropriately have 'Listed Building' status. The two stone bases (which are thought to have come from Thornholme Priory) were until relatively recently under the shade of a large Elm Tree (as captured on the front cover of the April 1976 Lincolnshire Life) which is said to mark the location where John Wesley the founder of Methodism, preached a proselytism (conversion) sermon.

### Minute 17/70 To receive and consider Planning Matters

(a) PA/2017/696 - Wressle Well Site. North Lincolnshire Council had received letters of objection based on fracking. Councillor Glover stated categorically that there was no fracking to be done on the site. The Chair had studied the information put onto the website that day from the applicants and that the information showed lateral drilling towards Broughton. He then read out an email from Councillor Keyes regarding concerns about HGV traffic through the village. The new information showed that heavy traffic was to use the roads through Wressle and Castlethorpe to the A18, the south of our parish.

**Proposal:** to respond with no objections

**Agreed:** by all councillors present. Chair to respond via planning website.

(b) MINS 2016/810-Appeal letter relating to Well Site. Original application was refused in relation to concerns about water on the British Steel site. The appeal will be considered in June at a planning meeting.

Both applications will be considered at the full Planning Meeting in June. All members of the public will be segregated from the actual meeting

### Minute 17/71 Gas into Appleby parish

The application had been acknowledged by National Grid. Clerk to follow up at end of month. Action: Clerk to contact National Grid.

### Minute 17/73 To consider North Lincolnshire Ward Councillor reports.

Ward Councillor Ivor Glover advised that due to the election the Council was in purdah. Councillor Glover also advised that Councillor Holly Mumby-Croft was standing for election as the MP for Scunthorpe. All councillors offered good wishes.
